Communion of Saints: The doctrine that a spiritual union exits between Christ and te all Christians living or dead; *saint* here is used in its original sense as meaning any baptized Christian.

Companion Diocese: Many dioceses in the Episcopal Church have formed official relationships with other dioceses in the Anglican communion, for mutual support. These are said to be companion dioceses. Clergy and layfold from one may visit the other and engage in joint programs; part of the purpose is to remind us that we are members of a worldwide church and t help us understand what different branches have in common as well as how and why we are different.

Compline: The last of the traditional monastic offices, Compline was said just before bedtime. Cranmer, in 1549, consolidated Compline and other afternoon offices into Evensong. The Prayer Book of 1979

restores Compline as a late evening office (BCP, 127-35) to be used in addition to Evensong or by itself.

Concelebration: The joint celebration of the Eucharist by a number of bishops or priests who sy at least part of the canon together, concelebration is especially impressive at a Eucharist when the bishop is joined at the altar by a group of clergy. It is an ancient practice which has recently been revived. Those who celebrate with the principal celebrant are called concelebrants.

Concourse: Name given by some modern church architects to a space that takes over the entrance function of the old narthex but is deliberately much bigger to provide a place where the congregation can gather and enjoy community before or after the Eucharist or at other times.

Consecration: In the Eucharist, the action by which the bread and wine become for us the body and blood of Christ. This includes the

offering of the elements, the giving of thanks (the canon or Great Thanksgiving), the breaking of the bread, and the giving of the bread and wine. This action is of the whole community gathered for the Eucharist; it is not just an action of the celebrant. Consecration is also sometimes used to describe the rite for the ordination of a bishop of the rites by which altars, chalices, patens, and church buildings are set apart for the service of God.

Constitution: Set of directions specifying how the church is to be organized and governed. There is one Constitution for the national church; each diocese also has a constitution, which adapts the national Constitution for diocesan use. The Constitution spells out the composition of a convention, among other things. Usually the Constitutions is bound together with the Canons. The vote of a single convention is all that is required to change or amend the Canons, but the vote of two conventions consecutive is required to change or amend the Constitution.


