Along with the Soup Kitchen, the Food Cupboard ministry began with a vision of helping those in need of food in our community and by trusting that God will provide abundantly more than we can ever ask or imagine. God's abundance is pressed down and overflowing every BAG DAY on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month. Those days busy for the especially volunteers who meet before Soup Kitchen starts and pack bags with an assortment of cereal, soup, ready to eat pasta, fruit, vegetables, peanut butter, and whatever else is in

the cupboard. Add to that, a couple pounds of frozen meat donated by Giant Eagle and the bags get really heavy! Since regular grocery bags tear and boxes take up too much room, we purchased heavy duty plastic bags with wide handles. Their red color and church logo keep the Soup Kitchen in the public eye. Most of the food is purchased from Second Harvest or bought locally. Ready to eat foods are preferred, as many who are food insecure do not have a working stove or only have access to a microwave or hot plate.

The Food Cupboard fills a need for people with special circumstances. Unexpected medical bills, high utilities, repairs, unemployment or under employment can lead to tough choices. Food stamps are not always an option and are not

always enough. Persons in need of food can sign up on Bag Day. One bag of food is given out per household. Donated bread and baked goods are available every Tuesday as supply allows.

Come, join us for lunch on Tuesdays in the Parish Hall. All are welcome.

From "A New Dictionary for Episcopalians" The Rev. John N. Wall, Jr.

Bishop' Chaplain: Member of the clergy designated to march before the bishop in procession and carry the bishop's pastoral staff.

Clerical Collar: Α white detachable collar worn with a black shirt to indicate that the wearer is an ordained person. Variations include the tabcollared shirt, which has an attached, matching neck and a white tab that is inserted in the front, and the rabat vest, in which a black front with a white attached collar is worn over a white collarless shirt. Although detachable collar the

standard equipment for our ancestors, clergy are perhaps the only people who still need collar buttons, used to attach the clerical collar. Clergy shirts are also available in a variety of colors other than black; bishops wear purple clergy shirts with their white collars.

Clerical Order: Delegates to a diocesan convention make up two orders, the clerical and the lay. Votes are taken in each order separately, and a majority of votes in both orders is required to pass a measure. The clerical order as a group also exists in the House of Deputies

at General Conventions, at which a similar division of votes occurs.

Clericals: Distinctive clerical street attire, as distinct from vestments, which are worn only in the conduct of worship. Clericals traditionally referred to the black suit worn by some clergy, but may also refer simply to the clergy shirt. Really means clothing that would readily identify the wearer as an ordained person. When two ordained persons are going somewhere and style of dress is not dictated, one may ask the other, "Are you going to wear clericals?"

The Children of Abraham Project

St. James Church will be hosting an interfaith program entitled The Children of Abraham Project on Saturday, October 29, 2-5 PM. This interfaith initiative is designed to bring Judaism, Islam, and Christianity together in open and honest dialogue to discuss their differences, and celebrate their similarities. It is our hope that in offering this event to our community that we mav brina change and reconciliation to the world - one mind, one heart at a time. Racism, prejudice, and violence are all-to-common in our society. Finding love and peace within our communities cannot be successful without each of us working together to counteract injustice the hatred, and stereotypical images that permeate our society.

An interfaith encounter is not about debating who is right and

who is wrong, who is "in" and who is "out" or who is enlightened and who is backward. An interfaith about encounter forming relationships with people who have a different worldview, a different religious or spiritual or philosophical approach to our common human experience. An Interfaith encounter is about learning the different narratives that inform how our dialogue partners understand the world. It's about taking the time and effort to try to look through their lens, even if only brief moment. Interfaith dialogue makes it possible to empathize with those who are embroiled in the worst of the conflicts that are erupting around the world.

This program was initiated by The Rev. Timothy Dyer, an Episcopal deacon from Youngsville, PA. He will be joined by Mr. Sam Qadri, who is the Public Relations Director at the Jamestown Islamic Society. He is
